A General Statement About The Course:

New Testament Research Study is an opportunity for you develop research skills to investigate a topic of your own choosing. Any topic related to your calling in the ministry is acceptable. So, chose something that gives step by step the "How to"... You will present your findings in a thesis. You are expected to demonstrate:

- 1. a good understanding of Biblical research concept and method,
- 2. the ability to reason and exercise critical thinking, and
- 3. the ability to communicate clearly, in both written form.

The thesis must be 150 pages (30,000 words), double space. The quality and clarity of your writing skills is all that matters. Keep in mind that the paper should reflect sufficient work to earn 6 credits for the year; do not expect to throw something together at the last minute and pass the class.

Your thesis will be published as a textbook and workbook. It is STRONGLY recommended that you look at thesis in order to get an idea of what is required to earn a grade in the class.

The first part of the course will follow a lecture format on the New Testament. The following lectures will focus on how to write a thesis and instruction on New Testament research. A few days will be reserved for other purposes.

At the appropriate time, the class will be divided into small "writing groups." Members of the groups will read the papers of the other members of their group. They will then make suggestions to improve both the paper's content and style. Revised drafts will then be submitted to the instructor to grade. Writing is an essential skill that has largely been neglected in university education. We're told over and over that good writing skills are rare, necessary and valuable. One important mission of this course is to help you to improve your writing.
